

PROJECTILE POINT MATCHING

Projectile points, commonly called arrowheads, are tools of finely chipped, pointed stone that are attached to the ends of spears and arrows. One of the oldest and most common archaeological artifact types, they are used for hunting animals as well as fishing and in defense. For this activity, familiarize yourself with the Projectile Point Flowchart. Then, from memory, draw a line to match the projectile point to its type on this page. **Hint: Some points will connect to the type more than once.**
